AWARD DESCRIPTIONS

About the Silver Award

This year, for the first time, our council is honoring Silver Award recipients. The Girl Scout Silver Award – the highest award a Girl Scout Cadette (grades 6 – 8) can earn – gives girls the chance to show they are a leader who is organized, determined, and dedicated to improving their community. After completing one Cadette journey – either It's your World-Change it! or It's your Planet-Love it! Or It's Your Story Tell It!– girls must identify an issue they care about, explore their community, pick a Take Action project, and put it into motion. The suggested minimum time for earning the Girl Scout Silver Award is 50 hours.

About the Gold Award

The Gold Award has evolved from a long line of Girl Scout leadership awards which recognize older girls who make a difference in their communities. The Girl Scout Gold Award was first introduced in 1980, but has been known as The Golden Eagle of Merit (1916-1919), the Curved Bar Award (1940-1963), and the First Class award (1963-1980).

Approximately one million Girl Scouts have earned the Gold Award or its equivalent since 1916. Currently, between 5-6 percent of eligible Girl Scouts earn the Gold Award annually. The Gold Award recognizes the work of Girl Scouts who demonstrate leadership, culminating in 80 hours or more dedicated toward a Take Action Project that has lasting effects in the community.

About the Young Women of Distinction Awards

Our second annual Young Women of Distinction Awards will be presented to three Gold Award recipients whose Gold Award projects stood out from the others in the areas of creativity, sustainability, and impact. Not an easy task for the Higher Awards Committee – with 17 truly impressive Gold Award projects in this year's class. The top recipient will receive a \$1,000 scholarship and two runners-up will each receive a \$500 scholarship.

THE MAKING OF A MUSEUM

For my Gold Award project, I helped the Glocester Heritage Society bring history alive within the Pettingell/Mason House. The Heritage Society is working to convert this house into a museum to share its stories and history of the Dorr Rebellion dating back to the 1700s with the public. My project helped develop a curriculum for the museum to implement a docent program for future visitors to be able to learn a large amount of information about the history. I also gathered and restored eleven pieces of pottery from the House, which dated back to the late 1700s that will be exhibited in a display I created, which will enhance visitor's experiences while touring the museum. Additionally, I designed a brochure for visitors.

The most successful aspect of my project was the curriculum I created, which included information not recorded anywhere else. The curriculum not only preserves a large amount of information about the Pettingell/ Mason House, but also provides a simple way to connect the community with the Heritage Society, and inspire historians to come to Glocester and visit the museum.

Katerina DeNardo Troop #106, Cranston, RI A HEALTH AND WELLNESS CENTER FOR THE WCRI

The purpose of my project was to provide The Women's Center of Rhode Island (a nonprofit shelter that provides temporary housing for women who have been the victim of domestic abuse and their children) with a variety of tools and resources that they could use to keep their residents healthy. To help them treat injuries and illnesses when they occur, I ran a drive at my church to collect over-the-counter cold and flu medications. Over 200 items were donated, including acetaminophen, ibuprofen, aspirin, cough medicine, cough drops and many different types of cold medicines. I also donated an Exergen temporal thermometer, assembled and donated a complete first aid kit and a comprehensive first aid book, and created a health and wellness resource binder to be used by residents and staff.

The most successful aspect of my project was the drive; I was amazed by the generosity of the parishioners at my church. The overall outcome of my successful project was that The Women's Center of Rhode Island now has a variety of tools and resources that they can use to keep shelter residents healthy, and to treat injuries and illnesses when they occur.

Jessica Marie Dowling Troop #464, North Kingstown, RI CHURCH YOUTH GROUP FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL AGED TEENS

My project addressed the need for a youth group in my community parish, Saint Francis De Sales. First, I met with the Parish Youth Core

Committee to lay some foundations on what I envisioned the youth group would be like. I also reached out to the teens at my church by passing out a survey, which allowed me to coordinate a meeting time and day and find out what kind of activities they would be interested in. The first meeting consisted of a pizza party and a discussion about two trips – one to Adventure Land and the other to Ocean Skates. I held these events to attract teens, and to give them fun activities to participate in. Once I attracted more attention from the first meeting, I continued to hold monthly youth group meetings with activities.

The most successful aspect of my project was getting a core group of approximately 13 teens who regularly attend all the meetings. I have formed and developed a very close relationship with them all. My project was successful because I was able to develop a group where teens of the parish could hang out and share their faith.

Lindsay Michelle Gimple Troop #932, Pawcatuck, CT OCEANS OF AWARENESS

For my Gold Award project, I wanted to inspire younger kids who live in my area to love the local marine environment in the same way that I do. Working with the New England Science & Sailing Foundation (NESS), I painted two murals and developed Twister games to aid the Sailing and Marine Biology programs in teaching about Stonington Harbor and Fishers Island Sound. One mural depicts an underwater scene featuring marine life that is commonly found in our local waters, such as scup, sea nettles, and Atlantic horseshoe crabs. Next to each marine creature are both their common and scientific names, as well as their actual size. The other mural is an accurate chart of Fishers Island Sound, complete with prominent locations and yacht clubs labeled. The purpose of this mural is to help kids learn the geography of the region that they are sailing and learning in. As a final supplement to my project, I created two Twisterstyle game mats, one for use in the marine biology classroom and one



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to help kids in the sailing programs learn the parts of the boat, all while having fun.

I think the most successful part of my project was the Twister mats. They are a really fun and engaging tool that the kids love to play and learn from. After a total of 136 hours spread out over a year, I presented my project to NESS last summer. It was an overwhelming success! The murals are in display in a marine biology lab/classroom, so they can be referenced in any lesson and the Twister mats have been added as a learning tool in both the sailing and marine biology curricula.

PROJECT SAAF (STOP ASSAULT AGAINST FEMALES)

My Gold Award project was to create an awareness campaign, Stop Assault Against Females, that directly targets the adolescent population and addresses sexual violence with an educational approach from a peer's perspective. As a victim myself, I created Project SAAF to prevent sexual violence from happening to others. My project serves as a resource for victims and raises awareness about sexual violence and its prevalence in today's society. Sexual violence is an issue that affects the whole world and needs to be addressed across the globe. Throughout my project, I had opportunities to connect with other sexual assault survivors, attend a press conference at the State House, and work with school districts across Rhode Island. I created a website, www.ProjectSAAF.org, to reach out to a greater audience and provide statistical information, definitions and resources for help. In addition, I interviewed three survivors and designed an informational pamphlet that was distributed at 30 schools around the state of Rhode Island. My project may address a small step in the big picture, but I believe that one small step in the right direction can make all the difference.

An important component of my project involved reaching out to high school students. Through sharing my project over the internet and working with schools to distribute over 600 pamphlets, I was able to reach out to Rhode Island schools and health/guidance facilities. My project addressed the very prominent issue of bullying in today's society. For my project, I held a workshop dealing with bullying and leadership at the Family Literacy Center in Lincoln, RI. I spent many hours



finding sources and doing research on bullying in modern day society. I was most interested in the role of the bystander, and how leadership techniques would help in bullying situations.

First, I attended a Leadership Compass program at the Brown Leadership Institute, which dealt with leadership techniques. I then got in contact with The Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership of Rhode Island for some suggestions on different leadership activities and styles and reached out to Ms. Marianne Douglas, a motivational speaker and author, for suggestions on different techniques to deal with bullying. After gathering all of my resources, I created a powerpoint presentation, brochure and activities booklet, and held an anti-bullying workshop at the Family Literacy Center. The presentation consists of spreading the message about the consequences of bullying and techniques to decrease incidents, the brochure gives information on how to report bullying situations, the booklet serves to inspire others to take the initiative as a bystander, and the team building activities promote collaboration and connection. I also created a banner called "Lead the Way to an Anti-Bullying Community." During the workshop participants signed the banner to pledge to help put an end to bullying in their community, which is now hung up in the Family Literacy Center as a reminder to fight for the cause.

The most successful part of my project was spreading the anti-bullying message to individuals in Lincoln.

The audience didn't just include my friends; they were performers and people in the community that I didn't know outside of the context of this project.
