A special guest will visit every week. The "late night" option, when girls can stay until dark to tie-dye and cook s'mores over a campfire, is back! Girls in 6th - 8th grade have two-week options, I Survived and Camp Special Agents, which include an overnight experience.

Camp Hoffman is the place to go for girls in grades 2-12 for overnight adventures! New programs include Whitewater Rafting, Cupcake Wars, Survivor Hoffman, and Rangers, along with a new Bike Newport

program taking place at Camp Rocky Farm. Theme camps include Percy Jackson's Camp Half Blood, Muggle No More, Mockingjay and CSI: Hoffman. Our beautiful camp property on Larkin Pond includes hiking trails, a low and high ropes course, sail boats, canoes, paddle boards, a gaga pit and fields to play games.

At both day and overnight camps, there are leadership opportunities for older girls who want to be part of the team!


Camp is open to all girls and financial aid is available for families that qualify. Bus transportation to day camp is available for an additional fee.

# **Volunteer Spotlight**

Marianne Pizzi was a Girl Scout from Brownies through Cadettes, and recalls attending troop meetings in a small kitchen in her school and participating in activities like cooking and

crafts. Similarly, Amanda Hanlin-

Hochler was a Girl Scout for 9 years and remembers earning her Silver

Award by organizing a community field day at Capron Park and learning how to cook in a dutch oven.

When Amanda's coleader stepped down after one year, Service Unit Manager

Diane Pelrine started a search to find a new leader. Diane, who has been a volunteer for 25 years, shares her love of Girl Scouts with prospective leaders. "I want other ladies to see that besides being good for the girls, it's fun for adults too. I also don't ever want to see a girl who wants to be a Girl Scout miss out because

there are not enough leaders," she says.

Since meeting for the first time 6 years ago, Marianne and Amanda have perfected the troop planning process. "When the program guide comes out, we plan the first half of the year and send a schedule to the other parents," says Marianne. Today, they co-lead Cadette Troop 907 in Wrentham/Plainville and Marianne also helps to lead a Brownie troop for her younger daughter.

Both women compare their co-leader relationship to a marriage. "We spend more weekends together than we do with our husbands!" says Amanda. Like a married couple, they have different personalities. Marianne is the one "crazy enough to follow through with plans", while Amanda is good at organizing calendars, excursions, and fundraising efforts. Having once been there herself, Amanda's advice to new leaders is to "attend Service Unit meetings, talk to people who have been leaders for awhile, and get

as much family support from other parents as possible."

Their "marriage" has even persisted long-distance. When Amanda moved to the Berkshires, they changed the troop meeting time to Friday evenings to accommodate their work-week schedules. "We survived because the girls in our troop are all active so we can do many activities with them," says Marianne.
